## Honoring Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women

### **Public Awareness**



## **Public Honoring**

- ► *Honor* Indigenous women
- ► Support their loved ones
- ► Support community healing
- ► Fulfill responsibilities
- ► Call for local, national, international changes

## An Alarming Pattern of Missing and Murdered in the U.S.

- ► Indigenous women are murdered and go missing at a higher rate than any other ethnic group.
- ► Many of these cases are part of the spectrum of violence against Indigenous women.
- ► On some reservations women are murdered at a rate 10 times higher than the national average.
- ▶ 2017 Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) homicide is the 6th leading cause of death of Native females between ages of 1-44.

## Lack of Consequences for Violent Crimes Against Native Women

- ► Indigenous women are vulnerable to a wide spectrum of violence often intersecting with cases of MMIW.
- ► The National Institute of Justice reports that more than four in five AI/AN adults (83 percent) have experienced some form of violence in their lifetime.
- ▶ Among Al/AN women, more than 1 in 2 have experienced physical violence by intimate partners or sexual violence in their lifetime, and more than 1 in 12 have experienced it in the past year.
- Vulnerability is due in part to the lack of legal consequences reflected in the low number of federal prosecutions of domestic violence and sexual assault abusers and sex traffickers.
- ► Vulnerability is also due in part to the lack of tribal specific services for Native women and the lack of full authority to protect Native women
- ▶ Due to this reality Indian tribes and Indigenous communities must be prepared to respond if a woman goes missing.

## A Pattern of Failed Systemic Response

- **❖** Native woman is missing
- ❖ Report is made
- Inadequate response by criminal system
- ❖ Community search for MMIW
- Community walks and other social justice actions


